



## Public Official Eligibility to Exempt Personal Information from Public Disclosure

Eligible public officials can request that the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV) exempt from public review certain personal information contained in their driver, vehicle, and vessel records. The personal information included in this exemption is the home address, social security number, date of birth and photograph of the public official. The request must be made in writing as required in Section 119.071(4) (d), Florida Statutes, by completing this form and must include a statement of eligibility on agency letterhead or include other documentation indicating the eligibility. The following public officials, their spouses, their children, and other family members living at the same address are eligible for this privacy protection.

- Active or former law enforcement officers;
- Correctional and correctional probation officers;
- Personnel of the Department of Children and Family Services who investigate cases of abuse, neglect, exploitation, fraud, theft, or other criminal activities;
- Personnel of the Department of Health whose duties are to support the investigation of child abuse or neglect;
- Personnel of the Department of Revenue or local governments whose responsibilities include revenue collection and enforcement or child support enforcement;
- Certified firefighters;
- Current or former justices of the Supreme Court, district court of appeal judges, circuit court judges, and county court judges;
- Current or former state attorneys, assistant state attorneys, statewide prosecutors, and assistant statewide prosecutors;
- Current or former human resource, labor relations, or employee relations directors, assistant directors, managers, or assistant managers of any local government agency or water management district whose duties include hiring and firing employees, labor contract negotiation, administration, or other personnel-related duties;
- Current or former United States attorneys and assistant United States attorneys;
- Current or former United States Courts of Appeal judges, United States district judges, United States magistrate judges;
- Current or former code enforcement officers;
- Current or former guardians ad litem, as defined in s. 39.820;
- Current or former juvenile probation officers, juvenile probation supervisors, detention superintendents, assistant detention superintendents, juvenile detention officers, senior juvenile detention officers, juvenile detention officer supervisors, house parents I and II, house parent supervisors, group treatment leaders, group treatment leader supervisors, rehabilitation therapists, and social service counselors of the Department of Juvenile Justice;
- Current or former public defenders, assistant public defenders, criminal conflict and civil regional counsel, and assistant criminal conflict and assistant regional counsel.
- Current or former county tax collectors.

The department records affected by this action include Florida driver license records, Florida identification card records, Florida motor vehicle registrations, Florida title records, and vessel registrations and title records. The DHSMV is not allowed to release the suppressed personal information of public officials except for law enforcement purposes only.
