¹ The "forgiveness" policy for sustained crashes is two years from the date of the most recent crash.

² The member may elect the alternative action of attending remedial driver training in lieu of the written reprimand.

³ No matter which option the member elects, the member will also be required to attend a defensive driving class.

⁴ Member may choose 8-hour suspension or a 10-day suspension of their take-home car privilege. If the 10-day suspension of their take-home car privilege is elected, the 10 days will be counted as calendar days and the member shall park their vehicle at the assigned duty station unless the troop commander determines another location. Members are still required to work their regular shift, which will begin when the member is in their patrol vehicle. Members may work off-duty; however, they must check their patrol vehicle in and out at the beginning and end of each day worked.

⁵ Counseling is a form of corrective action; however, it is not discipline for purposes of progressive disciplinary action.

⁶ Member will be offered discipline of a written reprimand up to 8-hour suspension or instead, may elect a 10-day suspension of their take-home car privilege. If the 10-day suspension of their take-home car privilege is elected, the 10 days will be counted as calendar days and the member shall park their vehicle at the assigned duty station unless the troop commander determines another location. Members are still required to work their regular shift, which will begin when the member is in their patrol vehicle.
