You have more influence on your teen than you may think. Be a good example and get involved in their driving habits from the beginning. And stay involved for the duration of their teen years. Before they get the keys, establish ground rules and make sure they take responsibility for their driving privilege. #TeenDriverSafety

Teach your teens – when you get behind the wheel, your focus should be solely on driving. Lead by example, and keep your hands on the wheel, eyes on the road, and your mind on driving. #PutItDown #FocusOnDrivingFL #TeenDriverSafety

Make sure you talk to your teen about what to do during a traffic stop – stay calm, be respectful, and know where your license, insurance, and registration documents are. #TeenDriverSafety

Do you know your teen's curfew? As new drivers, 16- and 17-year-olds have hours of the day that they cannot drive. Check out the chart below and share it with other parents and teens! #TeenDriverSafetyWeek

Set your teen up for success by helping them practice driving and study the handbook, and by modeling safe-driving behavior when you're behind the wheel. Give them the tools – and the rules – to be a safe driver! #TeenDriverSafety

With a learner's license, a teen must be accompanied by a licensed Class E driver 21 years old or older in the passenger seat. Learning to drive and teaching a teen to drive are big responsibilities! #TeenDriverSafety

Did your teen get enough sleep before they drove to school? How about enough to drive home safely after school? Proper rest before driving is crucial to getting to your destination safely. Drowsy driving can be just as dangerous as impaired driving. #TeenDriverSafety

As your teen learns to drive, keep passengers to a minimum. Extra passengers can be distracting for an inexperienced teen driver. Make sure they never try to fit more people in the car than there are seat belts for them to use. #TeenDriverSafety

Did you know, if you are under 21, it is ZERO TOLERANCE in the state of Florida for drinking and driving? It's an automatic six-month suspension of a driver license. Talk to your teen about their responsibilities as a driver and the consequences of making poor choices. #TeenDriverSafety
